Plan Your Next Park Adventure!

Buchanan County parks and natural areas provide year-round outdoor recreation and education opportunities. They meet peoples' quality of life needs by addressing physical and mental health, improving water quality, and fostering lifelong learning. They make our communities places where people want to live, work, play, and stay.



It is never too early to start planning your next park adventures. This newsletter provides options to participate in recreational and educational programs during the next three months. Most require preregistration, so plan now and get registered.

There are some great facilities that

allow people to experience extended stays in the parks. Fontana Park cabins, shelters, and some existing campsites can be reserved in advance. To make a reservation online click here. Some facilities fill up well in advance, so plan now.

New in 2024 will be the Fontana Park Lakeside Campground, providing hookups to electricity, water, and sewer at each site. This modern, 26-site campground is designed for people with various degrees of mobility. Each site will have its own concrete patio, table, and fire-ring grill. Three sites will be completely paved and a bit wider to better meet needs of people who prefer a paved surface to get around. Other features include: a "family style" showerhouse with separate rooms, each having a shower, sink and toilet; a small playground;

direct access to a Learning and Discovery Trail to be paved in 2024; and close proximity to lakeside fishing jetties and canoe/kayak accesses. Plans are to have new campsites available to be reserved by early October, so think ahead!

The fall season is among the most popular to get outdoors. Many of the Conservation Board's 41 managed areas provide trails meandering through natural prairies and woodlands. Most are open to public hunting. Plan your next natural areas adventures now by visiting www.buchanancountyparks.com and viewing the list of parks, natural areas, and river accesses. Anyone living in Buchanan County will find a place within 20 minutes of their home.

Aside from campsites, park facilities remain open throughout winter. Cabins make great winter getaways. Heated cabins are secluded near walking/cross-country ski trails. The Fontana Park Nature Center remains open during winter weekends. Ice fishing is popular on the lake. Make plans now for your winter park adventures.

Long-time Secretary Diane Johnson Retires

2023 Iowa Outstanding Tree Farmer of the Year

The Iowa Tree Farm Committee will present the 2023 Iowa Outstanding Tree Farmer of the Year award to Craig and Cheryl Parker of Buchanan County. Their tree farm is located north of Jesup and the land has been in Craig's family since 1914. The farm boasts 150 wooded acres including tree plantings and existing timber.

Working with both DNR district foresters and private forestry consultants, Craig has managed his land through tree plantings, tree protection, timber stand improvement, invasive species removal, harvesting, and more. Craig has planted several thousand trees over 30 acres along with implementing forest management techniques for natural tree regeneration. In addition, Craig plants between 200-400 trees and shrubs each year using his own tree planter. The Parker farm has also had over 40 acres of timber stand improvement completed since 2015 with 25 more acres planned for this fall. With help from neighbor Sparky Duroe, Craig has been an excellent steward of the land. He is always excited to showcase the work he has done to continually improve his property.

Reminder: Deer Stands on State or County Public Lands



All hunters are reminded that tree stands may only be placed on public lands seven days prior to the start of a deer or turkey season for which the hunter has a paid deer or turkey tag, and must be taken down within seven days of the close of that deer or turkey season. No spike, nail, or other object may be hammered or screwed into a tree. Those in violation of this state law may have their stands confiscated and/or be cited.


